

1. **GET** sb. **TO DO** sth.: PERSUADE, ASK, MAKE SB. (TO) DO STH.

2. **GET** sb./sth. **DOING** sth.: MAKE/CAUSE/MOTIVATE SB. TO DO STH.

These structures are used in *informal, spoken English*.

## 1. GET SOMEBODY TO DO SOMETHING

- Persuade, ask, make sb./sth. (to) do something

<b>persuade</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Do you think you can <b>get your parents to lend</b> us their car? <i>Do you think you can persuade your parents to lend us their car?</i></li> <li>• She's shy, but perhaps you could <b>get her to give</b> a speech at the wedding. <i>She's shy, but perhaps you could persuade her to give a speech at the wedding.</i></li> </ul>
<b>ask</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I have to leave. Could you <b>get Sam to finish</b> the report for me? <i>I have to leave. Could you ask Sam to finish the report for me?</i></li> <li>• I'll <b>get my cousin to make</b> a dessert for the party. <i>I'll ask my cousin to make a dessert for the party.</i></li> </ul>
<b>make*</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• How can I <b>get you to change</b> your mind? <i>How can I make you change your mind?</i></li> <li>• No matter how hard I tried, I couldn't <b>get the computer to run</b> again. <i>No matter how hard I tried, I couldn't make the computer run again.</i></li> </ul>

### \*CAREFUL!

**make** somebody **do** something (NOT ~~to do~~)

BUT:

**persuade/ask** somebody **to do** something

## 2. GET SOMEBODY/SOMETHING DOING SOMETHING

- **Cause or motivate** sb. or sth. to **do something**

- Your comment **got me thinking**. What did you mean?

*(made me think)*

- This article **got me wondering**: Did the Big Bang really happen?

*(caused me to wonder)*

- We finally **got the car running**.

*(managed to make the car start/work)*

- This film will **get everyone laughing**.

*(make everyone laugh)*

- A good teacher knows how to **get students talking**.

*(motivate students to talk)*

- I'm sure a bonus will **get them working** better.

*(motivate them to work better)*

You will find this structure in a lot of **songs**, such as

- "You got me wanting you"      • "You got me loving you"
- "You got me missing you"      • "You got me feeling (adj.)"

"You got me (verb + ing)" is a short form of "**you've got me (verb + ing)**".

Another way to put it would be "**you make me (verb)**".
